
In this report, we highlight the milestones that shaped our journey in the past year and the impact they have had on our academic excellence, student success, and community engagement.



THE PACK IS STILL GROWING.

- Enrollment has risen for the second year in a row for the first time since 2000.
- The freshman class increased for the fifth consecutive year.
- This is the highest overall boost since 1991, and the highest percentage increase since 1987.

By the numbers:

Overall enrollment grew to 11,790 +3.8% +431 students

- 1,758 new freshmen +8.45%
- +13.6% enrollment from Southern Illinois region
- +10% new undergraduates from the state of Illinois

New students with a GPA of 3.0 or better have increased 8.4% over last year

New transfer student enrollment increased about 2%

- Diversity increased.
- +9% Black students
- +12% Hispanic students
- +2.5% International students

The growth keeps going. Spring 2025 enrollment is up 3.3%, or 344 students, compared to last year. The increase – the second year in a row of over 3% – follows a fall that saw the highest overall boost in the number of students in 33 years.

- Undergraduate enrollment up 3.6% compared to spring 2024
- Including a 4% increase in transfer students
- Graduate student enrollment rose 2.5%
- Fully online new and transfer students increased 24%

• Continuing students rose 11%

More Illinois students are choosing Southern! More than 7,800 Illinois residents come here, up 5% from last year.

Opening doors.

- Saluki Commitment / Saluki Transfer Commitment. Funded by state's AIM HIGH program, these initiatives close the gap between financial aid and tuition and fees. Last year, we raised the family income limit to \$103,040.
- Since 2020, we've joined the Common App and signed agreements with several schools and youth organizations in the Southern Illinois region and the Metro East.
- Saluki Step Ahead agreements with community colleges pave the way for seamless transfer and online opportunities.
- The Dr. Seymour Bryson Future Scholars summer program gives a jumpstart to qualifying students.

OUT IN FRONT. Saluki Success Stories.

 \$4.2M. The Saluki Student Investment Fund, working on behalf of the SIU Foundation, hit a record high for the portfolio, and out-performed the S&P 400 Midcap Index benchmark by 1.35%.

SALUKI SHOUT-OUT The SIU Alumni Association awarded \$59,288 to 46 new and returning Salukis for the fall 2024 semester. Salukis help Salukis.

- Saluki Air Space. SIU Aviation's Flying Salukis hosted the National Intercollegiate Flying Association Region VIII championships. They dominated the competition, winning each of the nine events in which they were entered. And clinched their 13th straight NIFA Region VIII championship. But that's not enough for our team. They went on to take second-place overall in the National Intercollegiate Flying Association championships. Flying Saluki co-captain Dayne Snodgrass won the top pilot award.
- **Cyber Strong.** The SIU Security Dawgs clinched the top spot at the Illinois State Collegiate Cyber Defense Competition.
- Dawgs on the Catwalk. The Student Showcase and Runway Fashion Show is the highlight event for Fashion Studies students, who bring creativity, sustainability, and social consciousness to the fashion world.
- Student Employee of the Year. Pearl Williams, a Fashion Studies major employed by Rainbow's End Child Development Center, is the student employee of the year for 2023-24. Williams is a consistent dean's list student, a member of the homecoming court, a Sigma Kappa sorority leader, and a community volunteer.



Auto Worldwide. Automotive major Nathan Bulthuis was on the nine-member 2024 WorldSkills USA team competing in Lyon, France in 62 skills challenges across a range of technology, engineering, creative arts, transportation and more.



Rising star. Morgan Klover, a senior in civil engineering is named one of the New Faces of Civil Engineering-College by the American Society of Civil Engineering.

With our designation as R1 by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Higher Education, we join elite company.

HERE'S WHAT IT TAKES:

On average, in a single year: **\$50M+** in research expenditures **70+** doctoral degrees awarded

Higher ed's in-crowd. Less than 3% of all post-secondary institutions in the U.S. are designated R1.

A dynamo for the region. As the only R1 university within 100 miles, SIU is a research powerhouse for the Southern Illinois – and neighboring – regions.

Only a few in the state. In Illinois, SIU is just one of just five R1 universities and the only R1 in a rural area.

Winning support with a proven track record. In fiscal year 2024, SIU earned \$80M in research, training, service and other grants and contracts.





WHAT DOES R1 MEAN FOR SIU?

More graduate students. Ambitious students know that R1 status ensures support for research. And they know we'll have the faculty brain power to mentor and encourage their loftiest goals.

Research funding. R1 means we have a solid track record. Government agencies, not-for-profit organizations, and corporate interests know we are reliable and results-oriented.

Faculty prestige. We are nothing without our people. Our faculty are dedicated to teaching by doing, and that means research. The more we accomplish, the more top faculty we attract.

WHAT DOES R1 MEAN FOR OUR STUDENTS?

Opportunity. Bigger reputation means more resources. Even more research activity. Opportunities are around every corner!

Reputation. We're on the level with the Ivy League and flagship universities. We've believed in ourselves. And now we have the credentials to back it up. As early as Day One. Why let the professors have all the fun? We're serious about experiential learning. We've made it a habit to offer even first year students opportunities often reserved for graduate students elsewhere. Come here ready to go all in.

FROM PHOTOGRAPHY TO PHOTOSYNTHESIS. Not just for the sciences! Research is for seekers and creators as well as investigators, problem-solvers, inventors and discoverers.

DEFY THE NARRATIVE

OPPORTUNITY UNIVERSITY

This is what we mean when we say "for everyone." The Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Learning, the same organization that declares SIU a top 5% research university, honors us with another coveted designation: Opportunity University.

Higher Access, Higher Earnings. Only 16% of institutions nationwide are on the list of Opportunity Colleges and Universities – Higher Access, Higher Earnings.

Here's why:

- 37% of our students receive Pell Grants, MAP funds and other forms of financial aid
- About 2 in every 5 of our Salukis are First Gen meaning they are the first in their families to earn a bachelor's degree.
- Almost 40% of SIU students are ethnic minorities
- Earnings after graduation. A recent community impact study shows that Saluki alumni earn almost \$3 for every dollar they invested as students.









SIU researchers named as principal investigators in significant federal research grants FY 2021: 18 FY 2022: 19 FY 2023: 29 **RIBBON CUTTING.** Funded in part by a \$2.7 million grant from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity Wet Lab Program, **BioLaunch** is the newest addition to the Illinois Food, Entrepreneurship, Research, and Manufacturing (iFERM) Hub, a state-of-the-art research and training suite for faculty use, students, start-up companies and private firms in the region. iFERM capitalizes on the university's research and innovation into food, fermentation and biotechnology.



Grant-funded research. Jia Liu, foreground, associate professor of Civil and Environmental engineering, works with students in her lab at SIU. Liu's work investigating using magnetic nanomaterials to treat groundwater contaminated with per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, or PFAS, is one of many research projects funded by outside sources during the last fiscal year.



Gower Translational Research Center. The facility formerly known as the McLafferty Annex has a new name in honor of SIU alumni, Dr. Bob and Beth Gower. The couple donated \$2.5M to advance and support research at SIU. They have already established the Bob G. and Mary Beth Gower Scholarship Endowment in SIU's School of Chemistry and Biochemistry, which has benefited more than 50 students.

• Illinois Gray Fox Project. Already more rare than its red cousin, the Midwest gray fox population is in decline. SIU doctoral students Max Larreur and Nadine Pershyn want to know why.



HEALTH

• **Defeating supergerms.** Punit Kohli, professor, is leading a team of SIU research professionals and students as they investigate how to zap anti-biotic resistant bugs using electrically polarized nanoscale metallic technology-electricity on the nano scale.

• Al for food-poisoning prevention. Anas Alsobeh, assistant professor, is using a \$150,000 grant from the USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture to find ways to use Albased rapid detection systems to keep salmonella out of the food supply.

OPEN-DOOR UNIVERSITY

Growth — personally, and as an institution — is why we embrace diversity. It's part of what gives a university its purpose. Inclusion is part of diversity. A LEGACY OF WELCOME

Milestone anniversary. At 60 years old, SIU's Center for English as a Second Language is the third-oldest intensive English program on a university campus. Command of the English language is a prerequisite at most American universities. CESL has helped about 30,000 students from about 100 countries prepare to earn their degrees.

Friends of the Fulbright Foundation. A CESL partnership with FAF brought 13 vocational and technical college students from Columbia to campus this past spring to help them learn English. CESL hosted a variety of social and cultural activities to enhance the experience. Here's to partnerships!

New citizens. We are proud to be part of welcoming new citizens to the United States! SIU's Simmons Law School hosted a naturalization ceremony for 60 of the country's newest citizens.

CELEBRATE THE WINS

Lifetime Achievement. Pamela Smoot, assistant professor of history, received honorable mention for the SIU system's Dr. Wesley G. Robinson-McNeese ADEI Lifetime Achievement Award. Smoot was honored for her extensive on-campus involvement and countless hours advocating for students from all backgrounds.



The award is named for the

founder of SIU School of Medicine's Office of Diversity, Multicultural and Minority Affairs, established in 2001, Dr. Wesley G. Robinson-McNeese.



Diversity Week. When you've got a mountain to climb, it's important to note how far you've come. Hence, Diversity Week, held in the beginning of the academic year to set the tone on the theme of Creating a Culture of Belonging for All. A popular feature event — Diversity is..., a design project which gives everyone a say.

National First-Generation Celebration Day, x3. Turning a one-day national recognition into a three-day celebration, SIU and our First Saluki Center honored first-generation students with social and professional activities just for them. Firstgeneration students are those whose parents have not earned a bachelor's degree. They are and always have been an important part of our Saluki community.

CLEAR SKIES, SALUKIS SOARING

Saluki Aces, Air Dawgs and Tall Tails. Those are the names of the three two-pilot SIU teams flying in the 47th Air Race Classic. The four-day, 2,268-nautical-mile journey celebrates the history of women in aviation. The race route changes each year. In 2024, it started in Saluki Country, from the Southern Illinois Airport, home to the SIU Aviation program.

SALUKI SHOUT-OUT

We made the honor roll! SIU is listed on Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society's 2024 Transfer Honor Roll, which recognizes excellence in the development and support of dynamic and innovative pathways for community college transfer students. This is the second year in a row for our appearance on the list.

An important part of our transfer student service is Saluki Step Ahead, our partnership with a growing number of community colleges in Illinois, Kentucky, Missouri, Tennessee and Texas that helps students glide easily into select online SIU bachelor's degree programs.

Best Online Program. Congratulations to our online Business and Administration program, which claimed a spot on the U.S. News & World Report 2025 Best Online Programs rankings. We are in the top 25%, tied for No. 54.

Able Flight. SIU partnered with Able Flight, a national nonprofit scholarship program for people with disabilities to become licensed pilots certified to operate light sport aircraft. Five students enrolled this first year, learning from the expert faculty in SIU Aviation. Able Flight provided SIU with two planes with adaptive controls. Able Flight-founder Charles Stites praised SIU for settling the Able Flight students into appropriate housing, and also for the quality of instruction. Progress like this "can only happen when a university like SIU opens its doors to people who just want an equal opportunity to prove they belong in aviation," Stites said.

PRIDE

New name. Legacy of Pride. Welcome to the Paulette Curkin Pride Resource Center. The center formerly known as the LGBTQ+ Resource Center is newly named in honor of Curkin, who helped found it. Curkin, an alumna, worked in University Housing, as a student development coordinator, and a voluntary advisor for the Saluki Rainbow Network. She won the Lindell W. Sturgis Memorial Public Service Award in 2002, and the Administrative/Professional Staff Outstanding Service Award for 2005-2006.



KEEPING A PROMISE TO HIS MOTHER. Earl Henderson earned his SIU bachelor's degree in Organizational Learning, Innovation and Development during the December 2024 commencement — at 72 years-young! - Illinois TRIO Conference. More than 200 high school and university students came together to celebrate 50 years of TRIO, and to learn how the next 50 years will help students succeed.
- Southern Illinois Hemp and Cannabis Symposium. Hosted by our Cannabis Science Center, this showcase helped area businesses imagine more ways for the hemp and cannabis industry to become an economic driver in the region — and how we can help.
- Serious business. The John Allen Symposium brought at least 100 SIU recreation students and alumni for a day featuring career development, networking, awards and current research.
- Honors Council of the Illinois Region Student Symposium. Honors students from throughout Illinois brought their creative and research works to SIU.

BLEEDS MAROON, THINKS GREEN.

A beautiful campus. Laboratory research that reaches the world. Real-world experience that comes to the classroom. Blooming creativity. Responsible community. There's a place for forward-thinking, future-hopeful, nature-mindful scientists and artists, leaders and learners. **That place is SIU.**

SPACE-AGE CROPS. Student research. A student team, led by Illinois Researcher to Know Scott D. Hamilton-Brehm, are using microalgae to grow crops in regolith, which mimics the surface of the moon. The AlgaeUnlocked team is: Hannah Phillips, Alex Bechtel, Chetan Singh, Danielle Snyder and Alyssa Zhan.

SAVING THE OCEAN FROM INSIDE CORN COUNTRY.

Scientists at SIU's Center for Fisheries, Aquaculture, and Aquatic Sciences have been eager to grow coral as a learning lab experiment. A side benefit of growing coral is providing coral for home aquarium enthusiasts, thus reducing wild coral harvest.



SOLVING TWO PROBLEMS AT ONCE. What do you get when you take waste biomass and plastic and turn it into a slurry with yeast? Protein! And what do you get if you 3D-print that protein into cookies and other foods? µBites! (That means "microbites.") Lahiru Jayakody, assistant professor, is leading research funded by NASA's Deep Space Food Challenge.

HOW WE ARE CHANGING OUR WORLD.

It starts at SIU.

• Removing forever chemicals from groundwater. Jia Liu, associate professor, is using magnetic nanomaterials to treat groundwater contaminated with PFAS, or "forever chemicals.



Saluki Aquarium coral project. Ashlynn Shea, a Zoology major and president of the Saluki Reefers RSO. "The work I am doing here at SIU gives me the experience that I will need in my selected field. It's getting me experience that no one would have expected coming from Illinois."



- Keeping a food supply from eating itself. An interdisciplinary research team led by Jim Garvey, director of the Center for Fisheries, Aquaculture and Aquatic Sciences, and Habibollah Fakhraei, assistant professor, are looking for way to improve farm-raising largemouth bass—a popular sport fish and increasingly important as a food fish.
- Winning with Zero Waste. SIU is a national winner in the Campus Race to Zero Waste 2024 competition, Green Events category.

RESEARCHING WHAT WE WANT. AND WHAT WE DON'T WANT.

What we want: giant cane, a bamboo species once common in the area and an important mitigator of agricultural runoff. Jim Zaczek, professor, and graduate student Thanchira "M.J." Suriyamongkol, with the Cooperative Wildlife Research Laboratory, are ready to recommend management to help bring cane back.

What we don't want: nutria. An invasive, semiaquatic mammal is moving in, and bringing habitat destruction with them. Graduate Zoology student Derek Whipkey is investigating the



SIU Director of Athletics Tim Leonard announced the stadium club's new name in honor of Jim Hayes and in

gratitude for his family's continued support. Some of the funds will be used to revitalize the space.



HALL OF FAME

Saluki Hall of Fame welcomes six. New Saluki Athletics Hall of Famers, 2024: Jorge Delgado (Swimming), Korey Lindsey (Football), Rick Murray (Baseball), Rishonda Napier (Women's Basketball), Sally Perkins (Athletic Trainer) and Rick Walker (Swimming & Diving Coach). Missouri Valley Conference Hall of Fame inducts Bruce Weber. Coach Weber led SIU to a 103-54 overall record (.656) in five seasons — from 1998-99 through 2002-03. There's more! He brought SIU to two MVC regular-season titles (2002 and 2003) — and two NCAA



Tournament appearances (2002 and 2003). The 2002 team reached the Sweet 16: one of three Sweet 16 appearances in SIU history. The 2002 team was ranked 22nd nationally in the final USA Today/ESPN poll of the season and is the second winningest team in SIU history (28 victories).

ALL-AMERICA and OLYMPIC DEBUT


Celia Pulido, swim team, debuted in the Olympic Games Paris 2024. She finished 21st in the 100-meter backstroke. She was the fifth woman from our Saluki swim and dive program to compete in the Olympics, and the first since 2012. There's more! She earned First Team All-American status in the 100yard backstroke, setting a program and conference record with a time of 49.77.





BEST IN CLASS

Saluki Athletics posts a 3.299 departmental GPA last fall and a departmental cumulative GPA of 3.289. Sixty-seven studentathletes recorded a 4.0 GPA, while 46 percent were above 3.5. Of SIU's 15 programs, 13 had a team GPA above 3.0.
